172. APOLOGIES.

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors Mrs Bosworth, Mrs Gaffigan, Mrs Jalili and Mrs Percival.

173. MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON 16TH DECEMBER 2005

The minutes of the meeting held on 16th December 2005 were confirmed as a correct record of decisions taken.

174. LICENSING ACT 2003: APPLICATION FOR A PREMISES LICENCE FOR CHILLI MASTERS, 2 RED LION STREET, STAMFORD.

Decision:-

That the application for a premises licence for Chilli Masters, 2 Red Lion Street, Stamford be granted subject to the following conditions and times:-

*23:00hrs to 12:30hrs Sunday to Wednesday
23:00hrs to 02.30hrs Thursday to Saturday,*

subject to the following conditions:-

- 1. CCTV be installed and operated during opening hours and tapes retained*

for no less than 28 days and made available to the Police on request.

2. *Where the premises provide food to the public for consumption on or off the premises there shall be provided at or near the exits, sufficient waste bins to enable the disposal of waste food, food containers, wrappings etc. and these containers shall be regularly emptied and contents securely stored.*
3. *Where the premises provide food for consumption off the premises, the public area immediately surrounding the premises shall be cleared of waste food, food containers, wrapping etc. at the end of trading on each day. Such refuse shall be placed in a container designed for the storage and disposal of refuse and waste food which shall be constructed, maintained and located so that access to it by vermin and unauthorised persons is prevented and arrangements shall be made for the regular lawful disposal of their contents and the containers outside the premises shall be regularly emptied and the contents securely stored.*

The Committee had before then report ENV337 from the Head of Environmental Health and Licensing in respect of a Premises Licence for Chilli Masters, 2 Red Lion Street, Stamford. A full copy of the application was attached at appendix 1 together with a map of the premises. Attached at appendix 2 were letters of representation from Stamford Chamber of Trade and Commerce, Lincolnshire Police, and local residents.

The Corporate Manager introduced the application and clarified the names of the applicant, his representative and a local resident who had indicated that he wished to speak.

The Chairman sought and received confirmation that all parties had received and understood the procedure to be followed.

The Head of Environmental Health and Licensing introduced the report and outlined the application to the Committee, drawing attention to the objections which had been received and the reasons why the objections had been made. He reminded the Committee that two nearby premises had been licensed until 00:30hrs on Sunday to Wednesday and 02:30hrs on Thursday to Saturday.

The applicant's representative explained that the application was for a late night refreshment house and not for the sale of alcohol. The present applicant had been trading from the premises since 2004 and his father and grandfather on the same site since 1991. The application was only for the hours during which the premises had always opened. CCTV had now been installed and he suggested that a condition could be included regarding the storage of the tapes and their availability for the Police. Detailed reference was made to the Council licensing policy and the applicant's representative pointed out that once customers had left the premises they ceased to be the responsibility of those premises. He confirmed that the applicant would adhere to cleaning policies set out by the Council and pointed out conditions which had been suggested in the operating schedule. He also pointed out that any condition imposed must be necessary to promote the full licensing objectives, and stressed that the premises had been opened to the times requested for a long time. There was a demand for the service until 03:00hrs, given the location of nearby nightclubs and pubs who opened until that time. He urged the Committee to grant the application subject to the conditions suggested in the operating schedule.

Following questions to the applicant from the panel and the objector, the objector put

his case. A major problem was noise in the area which in part could be attributed to the premises but the objection was an attempt to address the public nuisance problems. He pointed out that other premises in the area were only licensed to 02:30hrs and it was felt that to have a later time would defeat the Council's policy. There was a significant problem with regard to litter from the premises and methods of control. He said that in his opinion any licence granted should go no further than others in the area.

The Corporate Manager referred to the letter from the Police, circulated with the agenda and, noting that the Police were not present, asked if the Head of Environmental Health and Licensing was aware of a Police policy with regard to the closure of takeaways on a "staggered" or other basis. The Head of Environmental and Licensing replied that it was not a deliberate policy to close takeaways before or after nightclubs. The Corporate Manager asked for comment on the closing time on other takeaways, as according to the objector, takeaways should all close at the same time, but the applicant's representative had suggested that this should not be the case. In addition the Police objected to extending closure times. The Head of Environmental Health and Licensing commented that there should be a variety of closing times.

In summing up the Head of Environmental Health and Licensing reminded Members that they were dealing with a Licence for late night refreshments starting at 23:00hrs and conditions regarding cleaning up outside the premises up to that time could not be imposed. The conditions suggested were in fact the Council's standard conditions.

The applicant's representative then summed up, reminding the Committee of his comments regarding the Secretary of State's Guidance which, if not adhered to, must be backed up by full reasons. He also reminded the Committee that problems in the street, according to Secretary of State, were the responsibility of the Police. The applicant's only responsibility was within his own premises.

The applicant, his representative, the objector and the officers then left the meeting.

The Committee then discussed the submissions made by the applicant and the Head of Environmental Health and Licensing and the representations made by the Objector. Whilst noting the Police concerns and the issues raised by objectors it was proposed and seconded that the application should be granted but subject to reduced hours to 00:30hrs Sunday to Wednesday and 02:30hrs to Thursday to Saturday, and subject also to conditions regarding CCTV and the Councils Standard Conditions regarding waste materials and cleaning up outside the premises.

The applicant, his representative, the objector and the officers returned to the meeting and were advised of the decision, as noted above.

175. LICENSING ACT 2003: APPLICATION FOR A PREMISES LICENCE FOR USA CHICKEN, 66 NORTH STREET, STAMFORD

Decision:-

That the application for a premises licence in respect of USA Chicken, 66 North Street, Stamford be granted as applied for, subject to the following conditions:-

- 1. CCTV be installed and operated during opening hours and tapes retained for no less than 28 days and made available to the Police on request.*
- 2. Where the premises provide food to the public for consumption on or off*

the premises there shall be provided at or near the exits, sufficient waste bins to enable the disposal of waste food, food containers, wrappings etc. and these containers shall be regularly emptied and contents securely stored.

3. *Where the premises provide food for consumption off the premises, the public area immediately surrounding the premises shall be cleared of waste food, food containers, wrapping etc. at the end of trading on each day. Such refuse shall be placed in a container designed for the storage and disposal of refuse and waste food which shall be constructed, maintained and located so that access to it by vermin and unauthorised persons is prevented and arrangements shall be made for the regular lawful disposal of their contents and the containers outside the premises shall be regularly emptied and the contents securely stored.*

The Committee had before them report ENV338 by the Head of Environmental and Licensing in respect of a Premises Licence Application for USA Chicken, 66 North Street, Stamford. A full copy of the application was attached at appendix 1 together with a map of the premises and attached at appendix 2 were letters of representation from local residents.

The Corporate Manager introduced the application and clarified the names of the applicant, his representative and a member of the public who had given notification that he wished to speak.

The Chairman sought and received confirmation that all parties had received and understood the procedure to be followed.

The Head of Environmental Health and Licensing introduced his report and outlined the application to the Committee. He asked them to note the times for the application and the three objections from interested parties. There were no objections from statutory consultees, including the Police. Although comments had been made by the objector that the application had not been properly advertised, the notice had now been displayed for the correct period and the application was valid. He asked the Committee to note that the application did not indicate any steps to be taken to comply with the licensing objectives, and in this respect he had had discussions with the applicant prior to the meeting.

The applicant and his representative then stated the case for the application. They required only the same hours as existing and it was pointed out that they were not near nightclubs or the town centre. The premises were not open for extended hours and they always closed precisely on time. The hours had not in fact changed for seven years. CCTV was provided within the shop premises.

The Head of Environmental Health and Licensing questioned the applicant and whilst indicating that he was pleased at the provision of CCTV asked for the applicant's proposal for with regards to waste. In response the applicant's representative said that the front of the premises was cleared after the shop closed and the resulting litter was stored in a large skip to the side of the premises. In response to further questions, it was confirmed that there had been no crime and disorder issues in the area of the shop and that the bin was sufficient to cope with waste both from within and outside the premises.

The objector pointed out that the wide pavement outside the shop was used for car parking and queried why this was the case. In response, it was pointed out this was a

Police matter and the objector said that as long as the premises was closed in line with or earlier than other premises that would then satisfy the objectors.

The Head of Environmental Health and Licensing then summed up the application, reiterating the hours which were requested and asked the Committee to consider conditions if there was a decision to approve. The applicant indicated that he had nothing to add.

The applicant, his representative, the objector and the officers then left the meeting.

The Committee then discussed the application and it was proposed and seconded that it be granted as applied for, subject to conditions regarding CCTV and the storage and disposal of refuse from within and outside of the premises and the cleaning of the street immediately outside the premises.

The applicant, his representative, the objector and the officers then returned to the meeting, and were advised of the decision, as noted above. The Corporate Manager also advised that the licence was reviewable at anytime following a request from any interested party.

176. POLICE ENFORCEMENT INITIATIVE AND MONITORING UNDER AGE DRINKING

Inspector Rose from Lincolnshire Police was not present and therefore the presentation on the above matter was postponed.

1. INTRODUCTION

The application is for a variation to an existing Premises Licence at a take-away food outlet providing late night refreshment. The application is attached at Appendix 1, together with a map showing the location premises.

This committee granted the existing Premises Licence on the 26th of September 2005 see ENV 307, and the minutes of that meeting attached at Appendix 3 of this report showing the Committees' determination..

However, if the business wishes to vary any of the existing terms and conditions of their Licence, the applicant needs to follow a set procedure, which includes consultation with interested parties, who are able to address the variations that have been applied for. If an interested party makes a representation objecting to a variation to the licence, the Alcohol and Entertainment Licensing Committee will determine the matter.

Zorba 4 is a takeaway situated in the centre of Stamford. They have been granted a Premises Licence to enable them provide late night refreshment. There is one letter of representations from the Police and 31 letters of representations from residents and one interested party. The letters, which were submitted within the 28-day time limit, are attached at Appendix 2.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Committee determines this application, with regard to the licensing objectives and the Council's Statement of licensing policy, concerning the variations that have been requested.

3. DETAILS OF REPORT

The current licence permits operating hours of 23.00 to 00.30 Sunday to Tuesday and 23.00 to 02.30 Wednesday to Saturday.

The licence is subject to conditions in respect of waste disposal and the maintenance of the existing CCTV within the premise.

The applicants seek to vary the existing hours as follows:

23:00 to 00:30 Sunday to Tuesday (as existing)

23:00 to 03:45 Wednesday to Saturday

The times the premises will be open to the public will be:

16:00 to 00:30 Sunday to Tuesday

16:00 to 03:45 Wednesday to Saturday

Please note: late night refreshment provision is only a licensable activity between the hours of 23:00 to 05:00.

The four licensing objectives of prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm have been addressed in the application.

The application has been advertised and the statutory consultees consulted.

The interested parties consider that the extended hours proposed by the applicant would have a negative effect on crime, disorder and public nuisance.

The Police object to the revised closing times, their reasons remain the same as the previous application, arguing the night time economy in the area currently close at 02:00 and there will be an increase in public disorder if more people are on the streets at a later hour. They report of previous incidents at the premises since they opened last year.

The Police representations also include a reference to two separate breaches of the current licence conditions. No reference is included to what action has been taken by the Police to address this matter.

1. INTRODUCTION:

The application is for the variation of an existing Premises Licence at a public house by extending the opening and operating hours and to include new activities. The application is attached at Appendix 1, together with a map of the premises.

The Licensing Act 2003 allows holders of a Premise Licence to apply for variations to existing activities and to apply to vary additional activities as are described in this application.

The applicant in this case is currently licensed for the sale of alcohol by retail. In order to vary any of the existing terms and conditions of their Premise Licence, the applicant needs to follow a set procedure, which includes consultation with interested parties, who are able to address the variations that have been applied for. If an interested party makes a representation objecting to a variation to the licence, the Alcohol and Entertainment Licensing Committee will determine the matter.

The Blue Bull currently holds a Premise Licence, under the transitional provisions, for the retail sale of alcohol on and off the premises. Drinking up time is currently 20 minutes. The applicants have applied for a variation in opening hours and operating hours. Removal of ten minutes embedded restriction to allow 30 minutes extension to permitted hours as a "wind-down". To allow the showing of television, video and films, provision of facilities for making music including live and recorded music (this includes by voice). The provision of dance the performance of dance or anything of a similar description. These events are all held indoors.

The applicant undertakes to provide a restriction to the use of Amusement with Prizes Machines to persons under 18, and also seeks to remove all the embedded restrictions under the Licensing Act 1964 and the Cinematograph (Safety) Regulations 1955.

The only representation that has been received is from the Police as responsible authority. They object to the proposed extension to the hours unless the premises have SIA registered door staff and an approved CCTV system installed. The letter of representation is attached as Appendix 2.

(The Police letter makes reference to occupancy figures. This has been discussed with the licensing section and the issue is resolved.)

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Committee determines, with regard to the licensing objectives, the application concerning the variations that have been requested.

The Council received a letter of representation from the Police. They object to the proposed extension of hours, unless the applicants have door staff and installed an approved CCTV system, if sales go beyond midnight. They argue

that as a town centre pub, with several late night outlets nearby, the change in the use and operation of the premises would attract a wider clientele.


8. CONCLUSION
