SKMP30*	South Kesteven District Council – Markets Enhancement	Grantham, Stamford & Bourne	£52,500	South Kesteven District Council operates markets in three of the district's towns: Grantham, Stamford and Bourne. This markets enhancement project encompasses a range of capital investment which supports the development and delivery of SKDC's markets, above and beyond what is achievable within the current operation budget. The project will provide equipment such as stall covers, new marketing, wayfinding and branding collateral, equipment necessary for safe operation, and costs to support the Markets footfall and development. The funding will allow for the purchase of equipment which will continue to be used for delivery and enhancement of SKDC's markets for years to come.
SKMP501	Stamford Youth Forum	Stamford	£51,326	Art Pop-Up on the behalf of Stamford Youth Forum are proposing to perform a community needs analysis, pilot engagement & feasibility study: pathway to supporting youth and families in South Kesteven. This is a defined project to support Youth and Families in South Kesteven through 3 phases, creating a pathway for strategic community led support. The project will produce a new, strong data-driven and lived-experience evidence base to support future planning, funding, and delivery.
SKMP502	Glorious Chocolate	Grantham	£33,000 - £35,000	Funding from SKDC will support and facilitate operations and production, enabling Glorious to invest in new equipment, new product development and employ more local people, driving sustainable business growth and higher profitability.
SKMP503	South Kesteven District Council – Deepings Community Centre	The Deepings	£200,000	South Kesteven District Council as the freehold owner of the building have external repair liability for the building which is currently leased to the Deeping Community Centre Trust. Following a survey undertaken by William Saunders Partnership, the roof of the Centre is at the end of its anticipated life. The roof has been suffering with various leaks and attempts to patch repair have been of limited success due to the roofs poor condition. Works are therefore proposed to repair the leaking roof covering across the building and will include PV removal/reinstatement, roof lights replacement, drainage and general building work costs.
SKMP38	SKDC – Table Tennis	Bourne, Stamford, Deeping St	£10,500	Funding for the installation of 4 table tennis tables across SKDC.

RF-500	Double Yew Nurseries	Bourne	£33,470	Installation of Solar PV panels on the roof of existing buildings with a view to generating in excess of 28,000kWh per annum. The project would save money on overhead costs. That money could be used to streamline costs to make Double Yew Nurseries more efficient, and to allow them to invest in other improvements so that they can remain competitive in a challenging market place and take the business forward. It would also reduce their carbon footprint.
RF-501	YP Genever & Daughters	Stamford	£8,500	Project would allow the expansion of direct meat sales through the purchase of a freezer trailer which would be used to store meat. It would also provide an opportunity to rent the trailer out to other businesses when empty.
RF-502	Clematis Cottages	Stamford	£27,000	Clematis Cottages wish to develop a complimentary business to the existing self-catering cottages. It is their aim to develop not just a version of "springwatch" in Lincolnshire, but an all year round "nature watch" capability within the grounds of Clematis cottages. Nature watch at Clematis cottages will involve the installation of a network of wildlife cameras (with tilt/zoom/infra-red and audio capabilities) in and around the grounds. This will allow them to not only record activities during night and day for our guests new and old, but also create reels, and have live streaming capabilities for distribution via a variety of social media platforms to a huge wildlife loving audience, potentially internationally. In addition to the actual hardware involved, this project will involve extending the already installed electrical and broadband network to supply mains electricity and hard-wired broadband to the cameras. This is essential to facilitate a robust economic and sustainable method for operation of the system.
SK-211	Tallington Village Hall Playing Field Association	Stamford	£15,000	Tallington Village Hall Playing Field Association are proposing to repair the playing field stone boundary walls, this has been discussed in parish council meetings and an agreement for the application was made by the body responsible for the upkeep of the playing fields. The walls are currently described as being in a perilous state and the works are therefore deemed necessary for the health and safety of the playing field and the local children that use it.
SK-213	Bourne Town Council	Bourne	£24,200	The Town Council has for the past 30 years erected Christmas Lights in the town centre for the enjoyment of local residents and visitors. The lights are now 20 years old and the whilst the town would love to see new lights, the cost of this is proving to be prohibitive. To enable the lights to be productive for the ensuring years, the Town Council has decided to refurbish the ones they currently have and also purchase some additional ex rental lights.



SK-217	South Kesteven District Council - Stamford Arts Centre	Stamford	£6425	Introducing the Watch Word System in Stamford Arts Centre's cinema addresses a local need for improved accessibility in cultural experiences. Stamford, like many towns, has a diverse population that includes individuals with sensory impairments, but few local venues are able to offer the necessary tools to accommodate them. As a result, many residents with hearing or visual impairments are unable to fully enjoy public film screenings, leaving them excluded from important cultural and social experiences. This project directly tackles that challenge by offering real-time captioning for deaf or hard-of-hearing individuals. By making cinema screenings accessible to everyone, the Stamford Arts Centre will create a more inclusive environment, ensuring that all residents can participate in cultural experiences.
SK-220	St Guthlac's PCC Market Deeping	Market Deeping	£20,834	In order to be more attractive to community groups we are proposing a project that involves improving the Green School, which acts as the church hall for St Guthlac's in the parish of Market Deeping, by replacing and enlarging the existing kitchen which is over 25 years old. The current kitchen has no cooking facilities, which restricts its usefulness to the community, and is very small. Some of the existing units are broken and cannot be used. The church already runs several community activities, such as a coffee morning and soup and social. Both meet the needs of the lonely and the isolated by providing them with the opportunity for friendship and conversation. Monthly the church now runs Messy Church which is an activity for young families. Other groups that meet regularly include: senior fitness class, community cafe, U3A history group, Mothers' Union, a children's play session, Ladies Guild, Glebe Singers and a crafting group. All would benefit greatly from a modern kitchen with cooking facilities and accessible toilets. We also believe the improvements we are proposing will enable us to attract more community groups
SK-221	St Guthlac's PCC Market Deeping	Market Deeping	£17,676	In order to be more attractive to community groups we are proposing a project that involves improving the Green School, which acts as the church hall for St Guthlac's in the parish of Market Deeping, by replacing the toilets so they meet the current requirements for disabled access. Although there is a disabled toilet, with baby-changing facilities, this is inaccessible by anyone using a wheelchair or pram. The church already runs several community activities, such as a coffee morning and soup and social. Both meet the needs of the lonely and the isolated by providing them with the opportunity for friendship and conversation. Monthly the church now runs Messy Church which is an activity for young families. Other groups that meet regularly include: senior fitness class, community cafe, U3A history group, Mothers' Union, a children's play session, Ladies Guild, Glebe Singers and a crafting group. All would benefit

SK-222	South Kesteven District Council – Dysart Park	Grantham	£12,250	The facilities within Dysart Park are available to the public to use free of charge and would ensure that the park and its facilities continue to be maintained to an acceptable level and ensure the continuation of the Council being awarded Green Flag accreditation. This project aims to undertake property improvements to the tennis courts fencing, car park pillars and a damaged wall in the park. To complement this the Council are progressing works to improve drainage issues across the park utilising its own funding with a match contribution of £50,000 for this.
SK-207	Stamford Welland Academy	Stamford	£100,000	We are currently working with the Football Foundation to build a 3G sports pitch at Stamford Welland Academy. The project has been agreed in principle; however, we have to find a contribution of £150K to the overall £900K cost. This is obviously a significant amount of money to come out of a school budget and any contribution we can secure towards the £150K, would help. The facility will be used extensively by local clubs and the community outside of school hours. Our facilities are already used extensively by the local community and clubs, and the demand for our sports facilities, far outstrips what we can currently provide.
SK-169	Langtoft Parish Council	Stamford	£19,148.48	<p>Langtoft village is divided by the A15 because of this villagers do not feel they have a cohesive and united community. The Parish Council want to visually unite the village and balance the amenities offered in each side of the village with two distinct Community Cohesion Projects.</p> <p>Project one: - Village gates have proved to increase the identity of a village, having spoken with neighbouring parishes these have proved to be beneficial to increasing identity as well as addressing speeding issues. We would like to install two signs on entry to the village one from both directions.</p> <p>Project two: - To continue with our strategy to promote healthy mind and movement opportunities for our villagers. Last year it was identified that the older youths and young adults had little access to healthy activities nor an area to encourage community connections. Last year we received funding for six pieces of adult gym equipment which we installed three pieces in each of the two village parks. This has proved very successful, and more pieces of equipment are now in demand due to utilisation.</p>
